DIRECTOR'S NOTE

What I love most about any play is the story and what I love most about a story is the people, their lives and the impact they have on each other.

Wrong Turn at Lungfish was written in 1993 by Garry Marshall and Lowell Ganz who created some of television's most beloved situation comedies including Happy Days, Laverne & Shirley, Mork & Mindy, and The Odd Couple—all about people. Garry Marshall also wrote the fabulous movies Pretty Woman and Beaches, both of which have elements of Wrong Turn at Lungfish.

"Peter Ravenswaal" is the former Dean of a liberal arts college who has recently gone blind. He is bitter and struggling to come to terms with his illness. His attitude means one rookie nurse is made to look after him because the senior staff have all refused.

"Anita Merendino" is a young, saucy and streetwise reading-for-the-blind volunteer with a blithe, sunny outlook on life. She also has a menacing, violent boyfriend, "Dominic De Caesar," who controls her both physically and emotionally.


"Peter" and "Anita" are an intellectual odd couple and when they meet, sparks fly! Both come into this relationship with questions, hers dealing with her station in life and his about his past life choices. The clash of intellect and wit takes the two from animosity and fear to friendship and understanding. They find that within each other lies the missing link in their own personal evolution.

Wrong Turn at Lungfish is a poignant, human comedy of character. Although written 30 years ago, it's a very relevant play today. Levels of domestic, racial and political violence, bigger class distinction and socio-economic problems have increased. We need to care enough to find the missing link, the wrong turn taken so we can ensure a safe and secure world for our children.

Tony began his theatre journey some 60 years ago in Melbourne and has worked for a number of Adelaide companies at one time or other since he chose to settle here. He first played "Peter Ravenswaal" in 2014 for St Jude's Players. He took six years off to complete a Visual Arts Degree with Honours and is now delighted to return to the stage to reprise the role of "Peter." He says there are very few roles that he would do again; "Peter" is one of them. "The mixture of caustic intelligence and physical and emotional frailty I find very appealing and a real challenge to make credible. It is a genuine pleasure working with Rosie again too,

the person who got me back into theatre in 1998 after a hiatus of 30 years. It's also enjoyable being able to work with Galleon for the first time."

TIANNA's passion for acting started in school when she auditioned for a role in the school play to build her confidence, and actually landed it! She completed four years of training with Actors Ink and, in 2021, she graduated with a Bachelor of Arts majoring in Drama from Flinders University. In 2024 she completed her second degree, a Bachelor of Creative Industries (Film and Television). Her theatrical talents have further developed through appearances on stage via the Flinders University Performing Arts Society in productions including *Almost, Maine* and *Beachwood Cafe.* In 2023, she captivated audiences as "Margo" in

the original play *In The Timeless Walls* for PitchWhite Productions. She portrayed "Rosie" in Loc'ally Theatr's 2024 production of Andrew Bovell's *Things I Know To Be True*, and "Margaret" in St Jude's production of *Silent Sky*. She appeared in the film *Roadkill* (2022), and was the stand-in for Julia Garner on the set of *The Royal Hotel* (2023). Garry Marshall was an American screenwriter, director, producer and actor. His career started in the 1960s as a writer for *The Lucy Show* and *The Dick Van Dyke Show*. He developed the television adaptation of Neil Simon's play, *The Odd Couple*, and rose to fame in the 1970s for creating the sitcom *Happy Days*. He directed numerous films, including *Young Doctors in Love* (1982), *The Flamingo Kid* (1984), *Nothing in Common* (1986), *Overboard* (1987), *Beaches* (1988), *Pretty Woman* (1990), *Frankie and Johnny* (1991), *Exit to Eden* (1994), *Dear God* (1996), *The Other Sister* and

Runaway Bride (both in 1999), The Princess Diaries (2001), Raising Helen (2004), Georgia Rule (2007), Valentine's Day (2010), New Year's Eve (2011), and Mother's Day (2016).

LOWELL GANZ

PLAYWRIGHT



LOWELL GANZ is an American writer-producer, who dropped out of college in New York to move to Los Angeles to pursue a career writing for sitcoms, starting with *The Odd Couple*. He wrote for the television series *Happy Days* and created two of its spin-off series, *Laverne and Shirley* and *Joanie Loves Chachi*. In 1982 he, with long-term writing partner, Babaloo Mandel, teamed up with *Happy Days* actors Ron Howard and Henry Winkler to make their first film, *Night Shift*, which was also actor Michael Keaton's first film.

His second film, *Splash*, starred Tom Hanks and Daryl Hannah, and earned him an Academy Award nomination for Best Original Screenplay.




